Prince of Peace opens in 1957

According to "Our Young People," a Sunday school paper published by Augsburg Publishing in November, 1957, the Evangelical Lutheran Church wanted to celebrate their 40th anniversary with a program of church expansion

—"a new church each nine days." Prince of Peace Lutheran Church was one of those churches. Rev. Robert H. Bragstad was called from Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Milwaukee, and he began inviting neighbors, saying, "Come and see."

On March 31, 1957, the first service was held in the cafeteria at Alexander Ramsey High School, with 144 people present. A folding table covered with a white sheet was the first altar. A white plant stand was fashioned for the first pulpit.

October 6, 1957 marked the formal organization of our church. Pastor Bragstad was installed, and the first charter member group was received.

From Pastor Peter Christ

I'm writing from the lobby of the Lutheran Center in Iringa, Tanzania, and struck by what an enormous privilege it is to be representing all of you as Prince of Peace in this beautiful country. Tomorrow we will board the small bus that will make its way south of Iringa Town, up into the mountains and on to the village of Bomalang'ombe.

I will finally see, first hand, the fruits of our long partnership with our brothers and sisters at the Lutheran parish. For five in our group, this will be the chance to rekindle old relationships; for the rest of us it will mean building new ones.

From my first days with Prince of Peace, I knew that this partnership with a congregation half-way around the world was something that brought deep pride to our church. I've been schooled in the "3 Ps" of Bega Kwa Bega, the joint oversight ministry of the Saint Paul Area Synod and the Iringa Diocese of the ELCT. The first P, **prayer**, is one that we take seriously as we've prayed regularly for our partners here in Tanzania. The second P stands for the whole host of

projects our combined efforts have launched, not just in Bomalang'ombe but throughout the country.

It's the final P however, that makes this arrangement truly special, and in fact, the envy of other ELCA synods and global Lutheran Church bodies. This is the P of **presence**. But this only makes sense as real relationships can only be formed and nurtured in person. Standing shoulder to shoulder isn't just a nice metaphor; it's the very literal embodiment of what loving our neighbor can and should look like.

I've experienced first hand how much effort is required to make one's way to this place. And now I couldn't be more excited to be following in the foot steps of all the Prince of Peace folks who've walked the roads of Bomalang'ombe, sat in the pews of their parish hall, danced, sang, laughed and gave thanks to God for this gift of true partnership. I will be overjoyed by the chance to bring words of greeting and friendship to them just as I will revel deeply when I return back to Minnesota with the same to share with you.

The history of this relationship runs deep; its nature is also changing. This is something to celebrate as our Tanzanian brothers and sisters have been accomplishing amazing things over the past 30 years. When our group returns, we'll be bringing with us more than souvenirs and memories; we will be carrying a message of hope for the future. I believe we have much now to learn from our ministry partners; and, with their help, I'm convinced God's mission for Prince of Peace will be even more spectacular.

From Pastor Lynn Erickson

Dear Friends,

Two summers ago, my daughter, Sarah, and I spent three weeks at one of the many Spanish language schools in Antigua, Guatemala. Early each morning, we took our place among the pairs of teachers and students at small wooden tables scattered throughout the school. With our expanding vocabulary and growing confidence, we used the afternoons to adventure. Although there were some highlights that make for good stories—climbing a volcano on a dimly rainy day and hiking to what must have been the world's tiniest waterfall—we spent most of our time exploring the beautiful city of Antigua by foot.

Influenced by Spanish colonial-style architecture, many buildings in Antigua have large heavy exterior doors and shuttered windows that don't allow even a peek inside. From the outside, it's impossible to know if an ornate door with fancy trim leads to a beautiful interior courtyard with lush gardens and beautiful fountains – or to a collection of parked cars. In fact, reading the road signs, I was forever thinking we had happened upon a park (*parque* in Spanish) when the door would swing open to reveal a parking lot (*parqueo*).

One afternoon, we were invited to visit the home of one of our Spanish teachers. “Come and see,” she had said. The non-descript outside of the low building was marked with a large, ugly swath of graffiti. It might have been a store, a workshop, a parking lot, a school. As we stood nervously ringing the doorbell, the heavy wooden door opened to reveal a lovely open space with guest rooms, a beautiful, well-tended courtyard with colorful flowers, and a kind, generous woman with open arms. For me, the surprise was breathtaking. What had I been expecting to find inside when the outside was covered with graffiti?



Come and see. I wonder what people expect to find when they open up the doors to a place like Prince of Peace and walk inside? Pulling open those sanctuary doors, would a visitor discover a congregation that is limping along or one that is excited about its mission? Opening the door to a meeting room, will they encounter complaints or laughter? Walking through the door into the fellowship hall, will they be surprised by hospitality or judgment? Generosity or fear? Are we more like a park or a parking lot?


Our hope, of course, is that people who have the courage to come and see will open the doors to receive a warm welcome, will be invited to claim and use their gifts, and will discover a place of belonging and purpose grounded in our Christian faith. We all share this intentional, important work — holding the doors wide open so that all may be welcomed.

Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks, receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened.

—Matthew 7:7-8

Perhaps next month, we'll talk about what we hope for not when people come in, but when the doors swing out into the world.

The theme for this Vine is "Looking Back; Looking Forward". In September and thru October we are using a liturgy comprised of various components of our past.

The Kyrie is from a LBW setting and is currently part of setting three. The hymn of praise is a few verses from ELW 720, "We Are Called," which just received many votes in our congregational hymn study. The refrain is also from Micah 6:8, which is also written on our skylight wall, in the entryway. The Gospel Acclamation is ELW 174 "Celtic Alleluia", which we've used MANY times in worship. The prayer song is part of one of Cathy Skogen-Soldner's settings in the brown Seasons of Song hymnal used in early band-led services and the gym services. On band-led Sundays we will use the Larry Olson Kyrie in setting 8, which has been used many times. It was really fun to take a look at what we've done liturgically over the years, and to try incorporating a bit of Prince of Peace history into each service.

The hymns we've been using in September, and will continue to use through October, are mostly hymns that received numerous votes in the congregation hymn survey. It wasn't surprising to me that "Amazing Grace" received the most votes in people's top ten. I sure had a hard time picking my ten favorite, and may have a different list today than what I turned in.

For the 60th anniversary service we will be using ELW 654 "The Church's One Foundation," which was used in many of the early services of Prince of Peace. We will also be using ELW 413 "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty" which I've heard was sung many Sundays as the choir entered the sanctuary.

In looking at the past, it is important to remember those that formed the church where we now worship. In looking at the past we can also see what hymns and liturgies were used and to see how they helped form what Prince of Peace is today. I believe it is also important to look at what we currently do and to think about how OUR hymns and liturgies can help us look to the future of what Prince of Peace may become.

We've been given a great foundation to build on, which means great challenge lies before us. We must keep the light of the Prince of Peace founders burning brightly. Having a better idea of the hymns that are dearly loved at Prince of Peace will help me keep the past alive, but also challenges me to try to keep finding new hymns that re-energize our faith.

I was very pleased that "We are Called", "You are Mine," and "Canticle of the Turning" received as many votes as they did. When we purchased the ELW hymnal I was hoping that some of the "new" hymns would become favorites, and it looks like a few have.

Sunday School Teachers Needed!

- * Sunday School Teachers usually teach two Sundays a month and rotate with another team teacher. The curriculum and lessons are planned well ahead of time. We even have a "Sunday School in a box" where craft supplies and materials are prepared, so all you need to do is follow the lesson and have fun with your students.
- * We will be offering several training and support sessions throughout the year, plus you can always email Tammy with any questions.
- * Parent Helpers usually volunteer in the classrooms 1-2 times a month. Although if there is an interest in volunteering more, we will always gladly accept the help. You don't need to have a child in Sunday School to volunteer and it's a great way to interact with our kids.
- * Lastly, we require everyone who volunteers with our children to take Safe Church training and submit a simple background check. This ensures the safety and well being of everyone.

We are asking that anyone in the congregation to consider offering some time in supporting our Sunday School. We're looking for parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, neighbors, etc. Remember that the children are the future of the church, and the education we give them in their early years will help set them on the right road for their life's journey.


