


God's story is shaping our life together.

"As we deepen our sense of how God's story and activity shape life."



The above quote comes from our mission and vision statements, and they describe one of the ways to see if we're making good on our mission to "build the church and love the world." But how do we actually go deep into God's story?

This is a question Pastor Peter and members of the Worship, Adult Education and Children's Ministry Committees have been exploring as they have set about to make plans for our upcoming program year.

One place to start is to consider how we engage God's story through scripture within our worship life. Most Sundays, the readings that we hear during worship, and the ones around which our pastors craft their preaching, comes from the "Revised Common Lectionary (RCL)." A lectionary is a predetermined set of scriptures chosen for each Sunday and festival of the church year. The RCL uses a 3-year rotation that focuses the assigned Gospel readings from either Matthew, Mark, or Luke and builds upon seasonal themes. Supporting readings from the Gospel of John, the old testament, the psalms, and the new testament are paired with the chosen text as well, bouncing around throughout the biblical narrative in support of the Gospel text.

For all of its gifts, the RCL also has some limitations; and a little more than a decade ago, two scholars from Luther Seminary began experimenting with a new lectionary, one that crafted in such a way as to help tell God's story through scripture with greater clarity. While the RCL bounces around between books and doesn't maintain a consistent trajectory, the readings of "Narrative Lectionary (NL)" remain chronologically intact while still following the rhythms of the church calendar. The NL is also structured around the traditional program year of churches in North America, starting in September and finishing in early June. This is especially helpful for communities that want to draw out common themes between worship and other faith formation activities like Sunday School and Adult Education.

While the lectionary is still snapshots of scripture, the chosen readings flow chronologically, beginning with creation, properly placing Jesus' incarnation, teachings, death, resurrection, and ending with the foundations of early church.

One of the developers and authors of the Narrative Lectionary, Professor Rolf Jacobson, will be with us on Rally Sunday, Sept. 16, to help introduce us to the lectionary as a whole and help us imagine some of the ways this will help to shape our life together over the coming months. Each week of the coming year, we'll focus on only one story from the biblical narrative and this will guide our efforts across each aspect of our ministry life. Two significant events shaped my ministry over the number of weeks, one unexpected and one long-planned for. My gallbladder reached its expiration date and required a quick response. I'm so grateful for all the support I received on short notice. So many were accommodating with all the shifts and changes this required.

I'm also thankful that I was still able to accompany the youth group to the National Youth Gathering in Houston. It was an amazing experience shared amongst a great group of kids. Erika's leadership brought us there and back safely. We were the beneficiaries of so much congregational support, especially Marge Beauvais' leadership and support, which allowed for something truly transformative to take place for our youth group. Amidst both events, some wonderful ministry at Prince of Peace continued to happen.

Staff Transitions

- Call Committee for Associate Pastor: I met individually with all four candidate forwarded from the Synod prior to the first round of interviews with the committee. I did not sit in on the group interviews but joined the committee in their deliberation and supported them in their discernment. I met again with final candidates following their second interviews, focusing on collaborative working style. I'm impressed with the work of the committee and have every confidence that we're on track to receive a wonderful new pastoral colleague in the near future.
- The Interview Committee for Visitation/Congregational Care: Pastor Ruth Sorenson-Prokosch was hired and began working July 17th. It's a joy and a relief to have her already in place.
- Youth Director Search Process: Two strong candidates were forwarded to the interview committee formed by the Youth Committee, both of which I have met with individually. In addition, the entire(!) youth group met with the final candidate to gauge their sense a capacity for future relationship. This has been a great process and we'll be excited to be announcing this placement very soon.
- Funeral Coordinator: Advertising for applicants has closed and we're continuing to seek members to serve on an interview/selection committee.

Program Notes

- "Drinking Deeply from the Psalms" was a delightful series for the first half of our summer. It was serendipitous to have the series author Rolf Jacobson cover for me on the kick-off Sunday. Thanks, too, to Scott Tunseth and Steve Sveom for their help in my absences.
- "Tasting the Bread of Life" series begins on July 29 and continues 5 weeks, through August.
- The Adult Ed committee has endorsed the plan to use the Narrative Lectionary beginning in September. Rolf Jacobson has agreed to come introduce the lectionary for the benefit of the whole congregation on Sunday, Sept. 16 (Rally Sunday). I will be working with the Worship and Children's Ministry committees in the coming weeks to finalize the planning around this shift.

- I attended "Love Let(s) Go!" a Stewardship training conference, July 9-11 sponsored by the Saint Paul Area Synod and will be attending another stewardship retreat in Montana while I'll be there on vacation. As you might expect, re-energizing our stewardship initiatives are the next big project on my horizon and I look forward to sharing more about this initiative very soon.

Though the many staff transitions are still underway, the light seems to be peeking out from the end of the tunnel. I look forward to welcoming these new colleagues and inviting them into the delight that is the ministry we share with all of you.

Message from our Kenyan missionaries

Gus and Anne Haugan received a letter from Julia Leiyoole, who wrote that torrential rains flooded much of the village of Arsim in Northern Kenya, where their mission station is located. They went to Arsim from Nairobi in the Landcruiser (that Prince of Peace had provided) with relief supplies for the flood victims: food, clothing, household items, blankets, school uniforms, and much more including funds to purchase 23 goats. The rain provided an enormous population of mosquitoes, and malaria was becoming a threat. They plan to go back to Nairobi to fetch antibiotics, malaria medicines, and mosquito nets. They thank Prince of Peace for prayers and for standing with them in their ministry.

The Leiyoole's work with the World Mission Prayer League. In 2016 the couple formed an NGO called Outreach Mission Team (OMT). (www.outreachmissionteam.com). OMT has allowed them to expand their work and see positive results in the church, community, and lives of the people they serve. It works in partnership with World Mission Prayer League and allows them to invite other volunteers and missionaries to become involved with their work.

They are involved in bringing "The Jesus Film" as translated in the local dialect to remote areas as a tool for evangelism, engaging in medical work through mobile clinics, expanding AA recovery work, assisting with educational support, and delivering food and water to drought stricken areas. Vincent continues his Business as Mission program through OMT. Business as Mission's goal is to bring sustainable change through micro loans, business education, and spiritual guidance. Vincent learned firsthand that faith and hard work lead to success and a deeper relationship with God. His passion is to empower the Samburu people to prosper spiritually and financially. The end result is a reduction in poverty rates and people who come to develop a healthy dependency on God
