Telling Our Story

In the weeks and months ahead of this coming year, we're going to be telling our story. In a variety of ways, we'll start piecing together all the elements that make up this grand tale that is our story. The characters, the plot lines, the settings, the suspenseful moments, the times of heartache and the times of joy, the long-boring stretches and the action-packed sequences.

All of it, together, will be woven so as to tell our story. And it should be no surprise to a bunch of folks that gather regularly to be the church that our story is told along side God's story, too. We can't really tell one without telling the other, too. God's story is central to our story and our story is central to God's.

But (spoiler alert!) there's a third story that is woven in with ours and with God's too. It's our neighbor's story, the neighbor sitting next to us, the neighbor living across the street from us, the neighbor living on the other side of the world from us. Our neighbor's story also has to be told in order that we might see the bigger picture and hear the fuller narrative.

And as we tell the stories, we want to keep weaving our story and God's story and our neighbor's story ever more closely together. Woven together so tightly, in fact, that you can't really distinguish one story from the other. Because this, all of this, is the same story, remove any thread, (ours, God's, or our neighbors) and the story will unravel, the story will lose its shape and its beauty and its strength.

So let's tell this 3-fold story. And to help us along the way, we're using a new "lectionary." A "lectionary" is what we follow to determine the scripture readings that are engaged on any particular Sunday of the church year. The "Narrative

Lectionary” is designed so that it helps to tell the biblical story while at the same time still following along with the liturgical calendar.

The most significant element of the Narrative Lectionary's design is that it keeps the reading in chronological order. We start this fall with the oldest stories from Genesis in the Old Testament and finish next spring with the New Testament writings of Paul to the early church.

The story that starts today will take many twists and turns. We'll be re-introduced to some old friends and we may even discover a new character or two along the way. As the rainbow in our sanctuary attests, through it all God will be faithful even though humankind will keep losing its way. This is especially good news for a creation that we have the responsibility to help in caring for.

We're excited about lots of things in the weeks and months ahead. We're excited to have Pastor Betsy joining us in ministry soon, bringing all her gifts to bear as we collaborate and co-conspire to build up this church for the sake of this world that God loves so deeply. And we're excited to be here with you, telling our story. Thanks be to God!

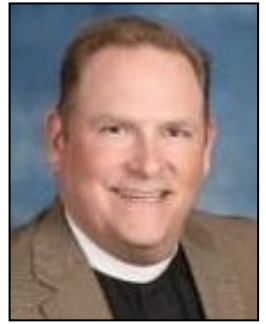

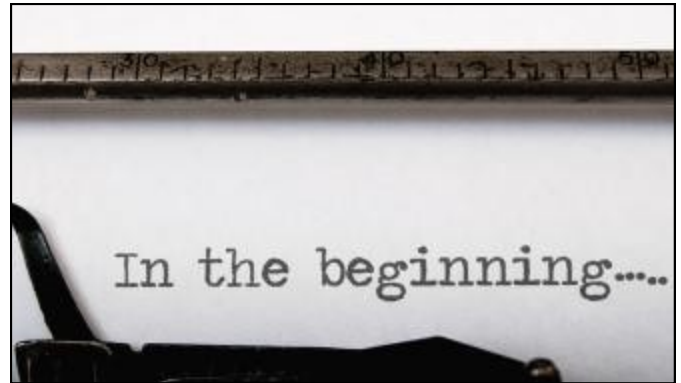
Pastor Peter: The Story Begins



The quieter summer days have quickly given way to a more frenzied pace from day to day, making me every more grateful for the additions to our ministry team and the volunteers that are back in action alongside us. This is an interesting time of ministry transition as we are bringing new staff on board and at the same time rolling out our fall programming. While I am still involved deeply with worship and our various programs from week to week, I'm also recognizing a shift to more strategic support of our growing team.

Staff Transitions

- Associate Pastor: Pastor Betsy Hoium has agreed to accept the letter of call we have extended to her. The final letter is under review by the Bishop's office. Betsy is prepared to begin her ministry on Oct. 1 (though she will be at a Cross-Gen conference through Oct 6). I have spent about 1.5 days with her in preliminary planning along with Pastor Ruth and Cori.
- Youth Director: An installation service for Cori is scheduled for 9/30 at 10:45am.
- Funeral Coordinator: I have met with the one candidate we have and Deb Cordes has identified the members of the interview committee.



Program Notes

- "Telling Our Story" is our theme for the 2018-19 program year. Theme verse and supporting information is being widely distributed. Special thanks to Professor Rolf Jacobson, co-author of the NL, who was our guest preacher on Rally Sunday and helped to introduce the Narrative Lectionary (NL), one of the tools we'll be using to explore our theme this year.
- Our use of the NL began on 9/2 with the Noah/Flood story. The symbolic rainbows will decorate our community spaces in September and October to remind us of the promises God has made for us.
- God's Work, Our Hands Sunday featured an in-worship service project re-introducing "blessing bags" to the congregation. There are more bags available to be distributed, please take as many as you would like to give away.
- Rally Sunday was the official launch of fall programming. A re-designed Sunday School program was introduced. All children (ages 3 yrs. to 6th grade) will begin the morning together for some music and story telling, then break into some age specific groups for additional activities based upon the day's story. A fantastic post-worship celebration, featuring a mobile Ninja Warrior course, was well-planned, well-attended and enjoyed by all.
- Our Adult Ed committee has worked hard to plan adult forum topics and speakers inspired by the lectionary.

And finally...

Recently, Anne and I and eight other members from Prince of Peace had the honor of representing Prince of Peace at the annual gala for Lutheran Social Services. It was an amazing night of highlighting the full breadth of the ministry we share with our partners at LSS and a great reminder of how much we can accomplish for the sake of God's world when we come together as one church. What a joy it is to partner with each one of you to deliver on that same goal as Prince of Peace.



Pastor Ruth: Living Out God's Love

1 John 4 says,

What images do you have for God?

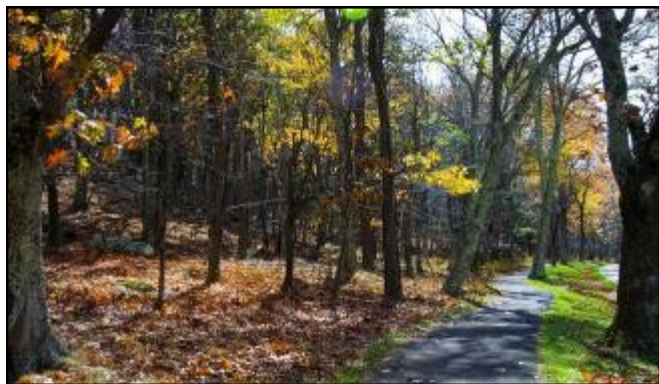
Who taught you about love?

October 7– *What is Covenant Theology?* In biblical history and within the nations surrounding Israel there were a variety of styles of covenant that bound the makers into an agreement or commitment. **Steve Sveom** will present some of these forms as well as familiar Biblical stories to help us understand the covenant of God with Israel (and with us). Covenant is a central theme of the scriptures, and a deeper appreciation may help us as we hear anew the stories of the Bible in the narrative lectionary.

October 14– *"As for me and my house"*— *faith in daily life*: A fresh look at our Biblical and Lutheran heritage will be used to suggest the important partnership between the ministry of the congregation and the ministry of the home. **David and Gloria Anderson**, co-leaders of Milestones Ministry, will lead a discussion on faith practices and resources to help, including one for our new narrative lectionary for Sunday worship. A key text for discussion will be Deuteronomy 6:4-9. David will bring copies of his new book: *Shepherd of Souls: Faith Formation through Trusted Relationships*, available for purchase.

October 28– Hear what the **Stewardship Committee** has to say about what "stewardship" means and about the goals of this November's giving campaign.

Bega kwa Bega Student Scholarship Update

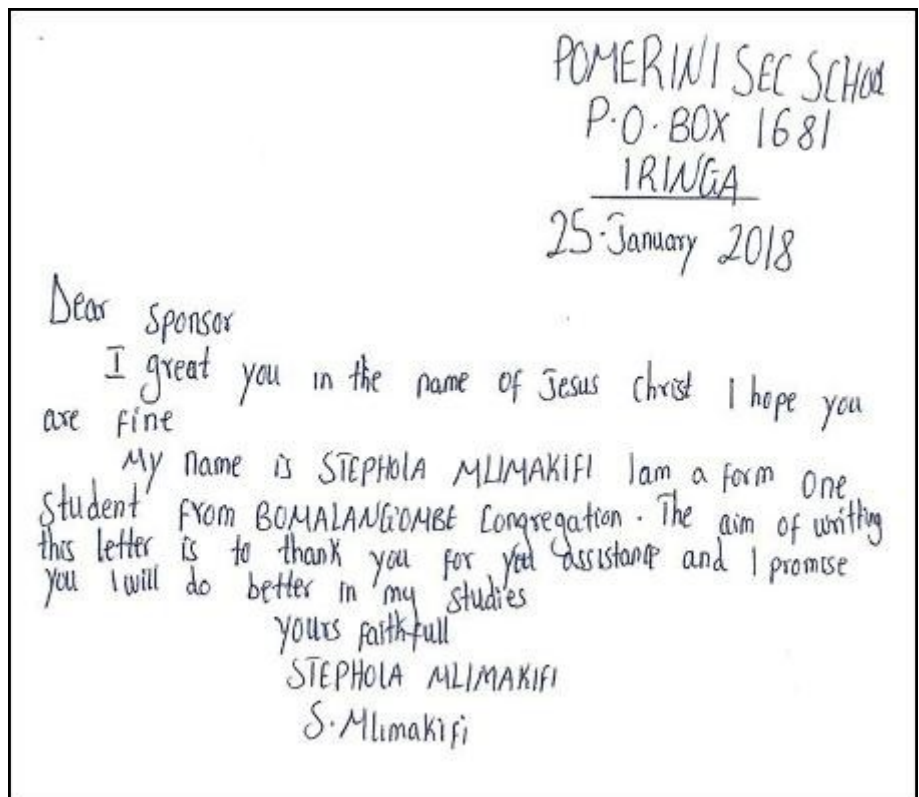
The Bega kwa Bega team in Iringa recently spent time visiting some of the secondary schools to visit scholarship students. Prince of Peace received a few photos and letters from some of our sponsored students!

For the 2018 school year, Prince of Peace provided \$8,000 for scholarships for students from Bomalang'ombe. Students are chosen by the congregation based on financial need and academic ability.



A few notes about this year's "scholarship class:"

- We are sponsoring 20 secondary school students plus continuing education for Evangelists through an extension program.
- 13 of the students are female.
- Our students are at six different schools; however, a majority attend the Bomalang'ombe Secondary School which is about five km away from the town. -15 are in the first four years of school: 10 are Form 1, two are Form 2, two are Form 3 and one is Form 4. One student is awaiting results of National exams to see if he can move on to Form 5. One student is in Form 5 and three are in Form 6.
- Scholarship amounts range from \$85 to \$750 depending on the school and the percent that the family or student can provide towards their education. The average scholarship is \$400.
- Prince of Peace also participates in the Scholarship Equity Program – there are many congregations in the Iringa Diocese that do not have a partner congregation. The Scholarship Equity Program provides scholarships for students who belong to congregations that do not have a partner. Prince of Peace donated \$1,000 for the 2018 Scholarship Equity Fund.

Children's Hat Knitting Group Comes to an End

After knitting children's hats on Tuesday afternoons for twenty-one years, the knitters met for the last time on September 17, 2018. Over those twenty years 4,112 hats were knit. This small group ministry started in 1998 meeting at Ruby Botnen's home for nine years. It was "Ruby's on Tuesdays."

After Ruby died in 2006, the group met in the church library for a couple years and then moved to Applewood Point/Roseville where Ardella Norenberg has hosted the knitters for ten years. There Applewood residents joined the group. Ardella holds the record of knitting 1,290 hats, plus mittens and scarves and finishing projects other knitters started. Photos were taken each year of all the hats knitted.

Hats have been given to Southside Family Nurturing Center in Minneapolis, inner city elementary schools, Plymouth Christian Youth Center After-School Program, Chinese Hospitality House, Karen Refugees, and 205 to our Companionship Village in Bomalang'ombe, Tanzania. This year 68 hats were delivered to Central Park Elementary School. Over the years the Prince of Peace participants have included:
